One of the songs Sarah and I have chosen is My Lighthouse by Rend Collective.

In the song we have such words as

Then later on we have the words

I won't fear what tomorrow brings
With each morning I'll rise and sing
My God's love will lead me through
You are the peace in my troubled sea



As well as the repeating line that says You will carry me safe to shore.

Our service has the theme of continuity.


It focus's on God's continued love for us during whatever we face. Our second song we thought about was Reckless Love.

With words like...

Oh, the overwhelming, never-ending, reckless love of God

Oh, it chases me down, fights 'til I'm found, leaves the ninety-nine

I couldn't earn it, and I don't deserve it, still, You give Yourself away



We are living in rather strange times, a few weeks ago Sarah made the comment (Phil mentioned it too in his service on Palm Sunday) that a few months if someone had said that we would be unable to leave our homes, to go shopping, come to church, see friends and that the schools would be shut until.... They reopen at some point.

She said she would never have believed it – it's like living in a film. A bit like the Truman Show – now the Truman show is a film about a man who was being brought up in a huge film studio and everyone he met was an actor...


And talking about films reminds me of something that winds Sarah up. Whenever we watch a movie at home or at the pictures I point out errors in continuity.

Continuity is when a movie flows along without any random bits or sudden changes in the scene. An error can occur such as frequently did/or still does in soap operas which have a very

fast turn round to film edit and get on TV.



Classic errors such as a shot of two people talking and one has a drink from a glass or lights a cigarette, then moments later a close up shows the glass is full again or the cigarette is very short then a cut back to the two people again and the glass is empty and the cigarette is long again.



There have been some famous ones such as the classic 1959 movie Ben-Hur which has a car in the background as the chariot race is taking place – however modern computer work on the movie has now removed the car. Or during a Victorian or medieval film an actor has place a coffee cup or plastic bottle on

the set which is missed and appears in the movie.





There are some people that make it a passion to spot these errors in new movies (I don't take it that far).

The word continuity means...quote from the dictionary

## "the unbroken and consistent existence or operation of something over time."

At the moment life is like living in a film - but one that has got problems with its continuity.

Basic everyday things like shopping have to be done differently. Sarah now shops online doing the click and collect...



then we have the wash and drip dry. Everything that comes into our house we wash in hot soapy water – I won't recommend



washing a box of cornflakes...



This washing does cause a problem though when the labels fall off tins. The other day the girls wanted beans on toast for lunch so we did and hip dip dip on three tins

and put the contents on the toast which happened to be cat food!

So as it was open we spread it across the toast saying it was salmon fish pate in jelly.

but she was eyeing up the guinea pigs....


Our continuity may have been broken and we seem to have lots of down days. I have been very encouraged by Nicky Gumbel (the guy that wrote the Alpha Course).

Each day I have been using the Alpha Bible Readings on my phone...it is great we have a reading from Psalms, then readings from both the Old and New Testament. Each section is followed by a talk and prayer from Nicky. As we were going into 'Lockdown' the readings focused on Moses and his leading the people out of Egypt and into the promised land.





These people had a stable life in Egypt having been there for around 430 years so their life was constant, unchanging that is until we read...



In Exodus 1:6-11 that a new king ruled Egypt and he knew nothing about the events of Joseph hundreds of years before - so he put the Israelites into slavery, getting them to build cities.

Exodus then records the birth of Moses and his eventual leading of the people out from slavery and on into freedom. And as the people left the normal everyday way of life albeit a life or hardship and slavery and on into freedom they complained about it

constantly to Moses. They didn't see/couldn't see the bigger picture their own land and freedom from the day to day grind of the slave drivers and overseers. In all their ups and many downs the Israelites faced during the forty years of wondering there was a constant there was continuity and that was God.

The song Faithful One is a great up lifting song for this present time.

Faithful one, so unchanging
Ageless one, you're my rock of peace
Lord of all I depend on you
I call out to you, again and again
I call out to you, again and again
You are my rock in times of trouble
You lift me up when I fall down
All through the storm
Your love is, the anchor
My hope is in You alone



Some of our visitors then had something to say, Stacey wasn't sure about what I was saying so Lacey explained it to her. Stacey thought continuity was a new girl in Lacey's maths class - so Lacey had to explain that it is something that goes on and on. Stacey said... what like mum does about my bedroom.



I was then allowed to continue...

God was with the children of Israel every single step and foot fall along the way. He was their rock in times of trouble even bringing water out of rock more than once. And when we look further and beyond the Exodus story and on into Joshua, Judges,



so many times the people called out to God for help. Then in the books of Samuel and Kings we see that thread of the constant love of God for his people.

We have seen some much love in recent times from everyday people so we are now going to pause for a time of prayer and reflection.




Linda led us in a time of prayer first for those caring for us, perhaps you could pray at home for our NHS, care workers and those front line staff.

As well as the ending to Romans chapter 8

For I am convinced that neither death nor life, neither angels nor demons, neither the present nor the future, nor any powers, neither height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord.

Romans 8:38-39

Then Stacey interrupted again, so Lacey explained what that means in that there is nothing at all, absolutely nothing that can separate us from God's love through Jesus.

## God is our constant He is the continuity for us all.

The one thing that Sarah and I have noticed in all of this is the renewed sense of community, people pulling together and doing things (albeit at a distance) And we as Christians can be a major part of that.
